

2019 SUMMER SCHOOL COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

ELEMENTARY

Primary Reading: Grades 1-3 at Metro North/Southwood Elementary

May 28 - June 7

Time: 9:00-11:00 am

These classes are designed to help those students who may be experiencing some difficulty with reading, language development, or just need extra instruction and experience to develop and maintain their basic skills. Open especially to 3rd graders who need to re-take the IREAD3. Students rotate to work with the teacher and instructional assistant using the appropriate MSDWC approved intervention programs (based on results of first attempt @ IREAD3 and/or classroom teacher recommendation).

Administer IREAD3 test: June 7. At least 15 students are needed to form a class. All students, North & South, will report to their home school. If there are not enough students, then it will be held at Southwood Elementary. A shuttle bus will be available at Northfield High School to Southwood Elementary then. (Pickup at 8:30 am and drop off at 11:30 am)

YMCA Summer Learning Program (SPARK): Grades 1-3 at OJ Neighbors

June 10– July 17 (6 weeks) No classes on July 3rd-5th

Days a week: Monday – Friday

Time: 8 am-3pm

Total participants: 90 (45 MSD, 45 City Schools)

Teachers: 3 classrooms, each with a lead teacher and a paraprofessional. No teachers on Friday

Beginnergarten: Pre-K students at OJ Neighbors

June 10– July 17 (6 weeks) No classes on July 3rd-5th

Days a week: Monday-Friday

Time: 8:30-11:15

Breakfast and lunch program is available for free each day. Breakfast is from 8:00-9:00, and lunch is from 11:00-12:30. Students attending the program will eat lunch each day.

SECONDARY

DRIVER'S EDUCATION June 3-June 14

Time: 9-12 pm

Driver's Ed will be offered to any MSDWC student that is age 15 or older. It will be held at Sharp Creek Elementary school. Call The Driving Center at (765) 640-0973 with questions. INDIANA ONLINE ACADEMY June 3 -July 18

Online learning provides flexibility for students to earn high school credits. There are a wide variety of courses that are offered through IOA. Students may take a course that MSDWC does not provide, such as AP courses. Students may also take a course that may allow flexibility in schedules to fit in other MSDWC courses. These must be approved by administration. There is a \$50 technology fee for the

summer. Otherwise courses usually cost \$275. Final Exams are at Southwood High School(July 11 & 18) and Northfield High School(July 10 & 16). The testing times will be on July 10 & July 18 from 11 am-2pm and July 11 & July 16 from 8 am-11 am. Finals must be registered online for times and availability.

Edmentum **June 3-June 27** **Time: 8-11 am**
Mon/Wed: SHS
Tue/Thur: NHS

This online learning will be for students who are recovering credits because of repeating a course or those that are interested in pursuing additional core courses. At least 15 students are needed to form a class. Seats will be based off of availability and priority when it comes towards graduation. All SHS students will report on June 3rd at SHS and all NHS students will report on June 4th at NHS. Those students taking Edmentum for credit recovery will be required to attend 2 days a week and can do so at either location. ***Due to ongoing summer projects, classes may be moved to a different location such as Sharp Creek Elementary or Southwood Elementary*** All final exams must be scheduled to be completed by June 27th. There is a \$40 technology fee. Transportation will not be provided.

Supervised Agriculture Experience Program ***Summary of Activities***

1. List in detail your summer school program.

The Supervised Agriculture Experience Program (SAE) would begin with a full day of classroom instruction for all students on the first day of summer break. The instruction would cover the development of each student's SAE project, record keeping procedures, the students involvement in leadership activities and community service projects, and setting a date for the first visit.

I am estimating 15 to 20 students will be enrolled in this summer course. It is open to any students entering grades 9-12. Each student will be visited a minimum of 2 times. The initial visit to each student would be conducted during the first 2 weeks of June. These visits would include an overview of the preliminary record keeping for the project and setting goals for each individual student.

During the first 2 weeks of July the second SAE visits will be conducted. If possible, some of these will occur at the Wabash County Fair. These visits will include an assessment of the record keeping thus far and a review of the goals to be accomplished by the student. Also, SAE students will be encouraged to assist with the booths at the County Fair to help fulfill their community service requirement.

During the last week of July, FFA members are asked to attend a workday at the Indiana State Fair. This is a one-day trip and will be another opportunity to fulfill the community service requirement for students. This will be the last meeting for the Summer SAE program.

I would estimate that each student would spend a minimum of 20 hours on their project. This number will fluctuate depending on the difficulty and complexity of the individual student's project.
